<ul> <li>Introduction: Read a short/simple story about a character exploring different jobs. Use visual aids and props to enhance the story, such as using a hammer for construction work or paintbrushes for art. Engage students by asking them to interact with the props and discuss the character's experiences.</li> <li>Career Music and Movement: Play music associated with different careers (e.g., classical music for dance, nature sounds for gardening). Encourage students to move or engage in activities that mimic the careers associated with the music, such as pretending to plant seeds or dance. Use visual aids to connect the music and movement with each career.</li> <li>Career Collage Creation: Provide students with magazines, printouts, and other materials depicting various careers and related activities. Encourage them to cut out images and words that resonate with them and create a collage on a large sheet of paper.
